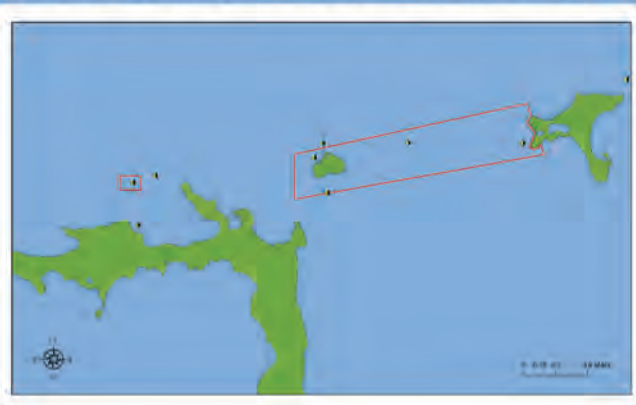
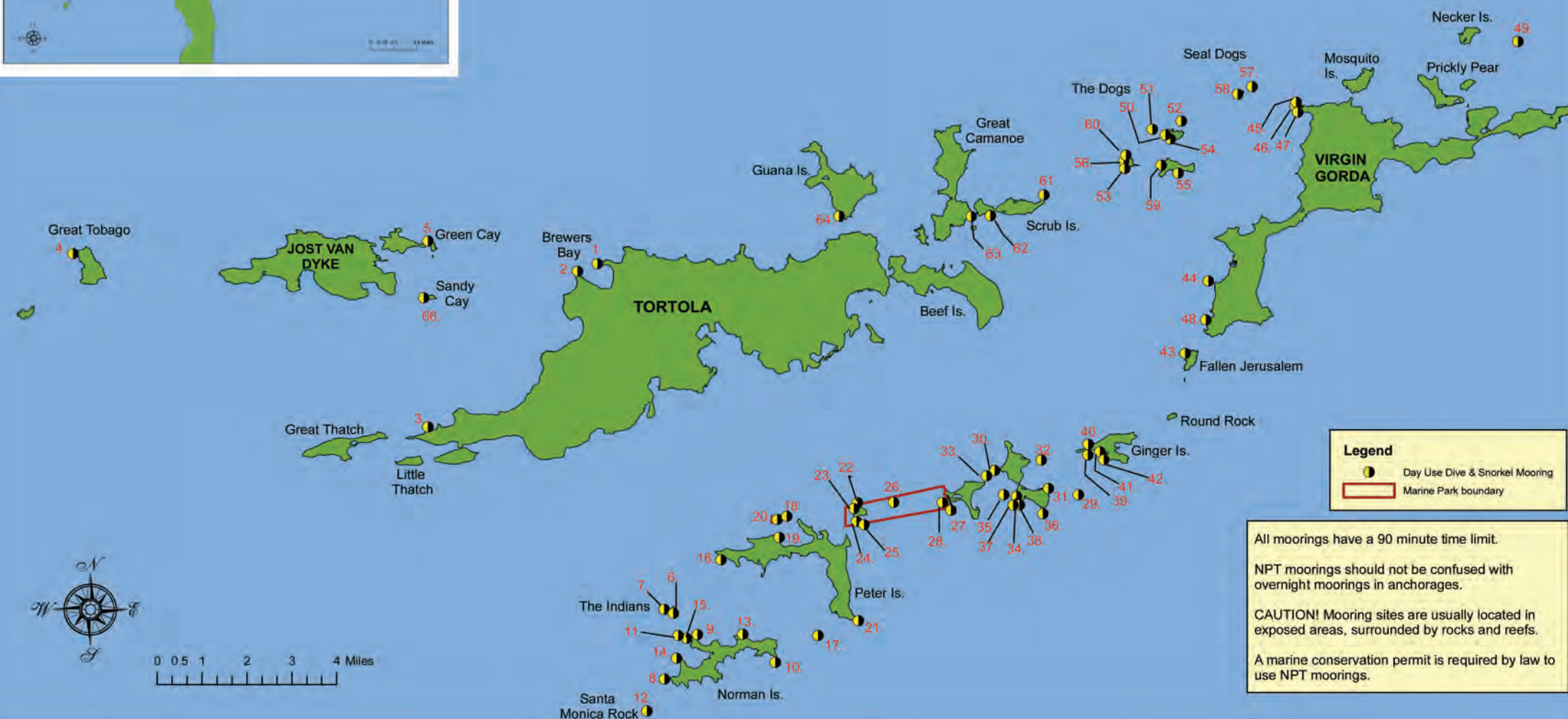

Procedure to Secure a Monohull Vessel to a Mooring Buoy



1. Approach red mooring buoy with pick up line and float



4. Adjust to ride evenly



2. Pass line through eye



5. To release, reverse procedure



3. Repeat on opposite side of bow



Use mooring buoys and do NOT anchor on coral

Anchoring & Mooring Regulations

The National Parks Regulations 2008 strictly prohibit the following activities:

- Anchoring in the Wreck of the Rhone Marine Park;
- Securing more than one vessel to a mooring at any time;
- Fishing from a mooring;
- Exceeding the 90 minute time limit on a mooring;
- Carrying out any activity that could damage a mooring;
- Endangering the health and safety of divers and snorkelers within a mooring area;
- Exceeding a speed of 5 knots within 250 yards of a mooring;
- Anchoring within 100 yards of a mooring, where anchoring is permitted in sand;
- Discharging sewage whilst on or near a mooring;
- Mooring a vessel overnight.

Requirements

A marine conservation permit is required by law to use a National Park mooring buoy.

Reminders

- Do not anchor on coral at any time;
- The maximum size vessel permitted to use a National Parks Trust mooring is 70ft or 35 tons.

Penalties

- Failure to adhere to these Regulations may result in a fine not exceeding \$10,000 or imprisonment for a maximum of 1 year.

Mooring Buoy Colour Code System

- Yellow: Commercial vessels only
- Red: Private and bareboat vessels
- Blue: Dinghies only



In an emergency dial 767 to contact Virgin Islands Search and Rescue (VISAR) or call mayday on VHF Ch. 16 to request assistance from any vessel

Procedure to Secure a Multihull Vessel to a Mooring Buoy



1. Approach red mooring buoy with pick up line & float



4. Repeat on opposite bow



2. Note prepped lines on port & starboard side, also crew standing by with boat hook



5. Adjust to ride evenly



3. On recovery of pick up line, pass first line through eye & secure on same side



6. To release, reverse procedure & ensure pick up line is clear of vessel

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
